Advocacy in Action Through Assistive Technology

At Hope Association's Fourth Street Home, we believe that every person deserves to be heard, understood, respected, and empowered to live a life that reflects their own choices and goals. Over the past year, our team has embraced that belief by becoming strong advocates for Assistive Technology (AT) and exploring new ways technology can help the individuals we support achieve greater independence and self-expression.

Assistive Technology is much more than devices and equipment. It is about opening doors. It is about finding new ways for people to communicate, make choices, build relationships, access their communities, and participate fully in their own lives.

Our Fourth Street team has worked tirelessly to identify technology solutions that match each person's unique strengths, interests, and needs. Through communication assessments, AT consultations, individualized planning, and collaboration with families, guardians, therapists, and support teams, we have helped bring innovative tools into everyday life.

Some of the exciting technology supports being explored and utilized include communication applications, tablets, visual supports, adaptive equipment, and other personalized devices designed to increase independence and self-advocacy. For several individuals, these tools are creating opportunities to express preferences, participate more actively in meetings, communicate wants and needs, and engage with their communities in ways that were previously difficult.

There Really Is Something for Everyone

One of the most exciting things we have learned through our Assistive Technology journey is that there truly is something for everyone. No goal is too big, and no task is too small. From the moment a person wakes up until they go to bed at night, there are tools and technologies available that can increase independence, safety, comfort, communication, and overall quality of life.

For personal care, we have discovered an incredible variety of adaptive equipment designed to help people maintain their independence with dignity. Shower chairs and bath stools are available in many different sizes and configurations to meet individual needs. Long-handled bathing tools, hand-held showerheads, adaptive toothbrushes, water flossers, and specialized oral care devices make it easier for individuals to independently manage their hygiene while promoting better overall health.

In the kitchen, Assistive Technology is opening doors to greater participation in meal preparation and dining. Adaptive cooking tools such as wooden rocker knives, hand choppers, adaptive cutting boards, weighted utensils, angled silverware, and easy-grip kitchen tools help individuals prepare meals and enjoy dining with greater independence and confidence.

Mobility technology has advanced tremendously in recent years. Today's wheelchairs offer features that were unimaginable just a few years ago. One individual supported by our team uses a power wheelchair that can raise and lower to different heights, allowing them to make eye contact at the same level as a conversation partner or elevate themselves to a countertop to actively participate in meal preparation. Simple features like these promote dignity, inclusion, and meaningful involvement in everyday activities.

Another individual we support has limited mobility but still desires the independence that comes with directing their own movement. Through specialized wheelchair technology, this individual can control the direction of their chair using hand sensors mounted on their tray. A simple movement of their hand guides the chair where they want to go. They also have access to controls that allow them to independently recline and reposition themselves throughout the day without relying on staff assistance. These innovations provide opportunities for greater self-determination and personal control.

Communication technology continues to be one of the most life-changing areas of Assistive Technology. Communication devices help individuals share their thoughts, preferences, choices, feelings, and needs while also helping staff better understand and support them. There is no single communication device that works for everyone. Finding the right solution often requires patience, creativity, and trial and error. Whether it is speech-generating devices, tablets, communication applications, picture-based systems, or other alternative communication methods, the goal remains the same: ensuring every person has a voice and the opportunity to be heard.

We have also been amazed by emerging rehabilitation technologies. One example is a robotic therapy glove designed to support an individual who experiences paralysis on one side of their body. These innovative devices use advanced movement and sensory feedback techniques to encourage muscle activation and promote neurological recovery. By helping individuals repeatedly practice movements and engage affected muscles, this type of technology can assist in rebuilding confidence, increasing function, and supporting greater independence.

What excites us most is not the technology itself, it's what the technology makes possible. Every device represents an opportunity. An opportunity to communicate. An opportunity to make choices. An opportunity to prepare a meal, participate in a conversation, manage personal care, access the community, or simply do something independently that may not have been possible before.

At Fourth Street, we have learned that Assistive Technology is much more than equipment. It is advocacy in action. It is a commitment to the belief that every individual deserves the opportunity to pursue the life they want to live. As technology continues to evolve, we look forward to discovering even more creative ways to support independence, self-advocacy, and the principle we value so deeply: Nothing About Me Without Me.

Assistive Technology doesn't replace a person's abilities, it unlocks them. Every new device is another opportunity for an individual to exercise choice, gain independence, and live the life they want to live. At Fourth Street, we are proud to advocate for those opportunities every day.

What makes these successes truly meaningful is the dedication of our staff. Our Direct Support Professionals continually learn new technology systems, practice communication methods, and adapt support to ensure the individuals we serve have every opportunity to succeed.
